Free Trips for State Employees: Request Ethics Advice Before You Start Packing

Many state employees take trips to attend conferences, meetings, and other events in connection with their state employment. Code prohibits all gifts of travel for state employees? No. Whether an employee may accept a gift of travel depends in large part on whether official action by the employee or the employee's agency, and whether the trip will provide a benefit to the

penses. For example, a professional association that is hosting a conference on the mainland may invite a state employee to participate in the program and may offer to pay for the employee's travel expenses for the conference.

Under the State Ethics Code, the payment of a state employee's travel expenses by a non-state entity is consid- trip. The form ("Request for Guidered a "gift" and is subject to the statute's gifts law. The gifts law prohibits an employee from accepting any gift, including travel, if it appears the gift is offered to influence or reward official action. The State Ethics Code also prohibits an employee from soliciting or accepting "unwarranted" privileges, including travel-related benefits, that are offered solely because of the person's state position.

ETHICS GUIDELINES FOR ALOHA UNITED WAY FUNDRAISING ACTIVITIES

The 2015 Aloha United Way Live United Coordinated Campaign starts August 18 and runs through October 2. As it has in the past, the

State is participating in the AUW Campaign by asking agencies to assign campaign coordinators who are responsible for leading their respective agencies and encouraging fellow employees to give to the AUW Campaign.

Fundraising activities in state agencies often raise ethics concerns because the State Ethics Code pro-

hibits the use of state time, equipment, and facilities for "private business" purposes, which includes fundraising for charities. The AUW Campaign, however, funds a broad range of community services in Hawaii and has been adopted by the State as "public business." The State has authorized the use of state resources, including state personnel, to support AUW through the State's annual workplace giving program.

Employees' participation in the AUW Campaign, however, must be

"Employees cannot be pressured or coerced, directly or indirectly, into donating to AUW or its partner charities." <u>voluntary</u>. Employees cannot be pressured or coerced, directly or indirectly, into donating to AUW or its partner charities; agencies cannot post the names of employees who have or have not donated to AUW.

State agencies often raise funds for AUW through auctions and food sales. Some fundraising activi-

ties may raise additional ethics issues. Employees who are planning fundraising activities as part of their agencies' participation in the AUW Campaign are encouraged to review these guidelines and contact the Commission with any questions.
