NOTICE OF HEARING

On June 21, 2018, the Hawaii State Ethics Commission (“Commission”) issued Charge No. COMPL-C-17-00433 (“Charge”) against Johanna Kamaunu (“Respondent”), a member of the Island Burial Council of Maui/Lanai. On February 21, 2019, the Commission, pursuant to Hawaii Revised Statutes (“HRS”) section 84-31(b), issued a Further Statement of Alleged Violation against Respondent.

On March 11, 2019, copies of the Charge and the Further Statement of Alleged Violation were served upon Respondent pursuant to HRS section 84-31(b). Respondent did not file an Answer to the Further Statement of Alleged Violation.

Having concluded that there is probable cause to believe that a violation of HRS chapter 84, the State Ethics Code, has been committed, the Commission issues this Notice of Hearing pursuant to HRS section 84-31(c).

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that a formal contested case hearing on the Further Statement of Alleged Violation will be held before the Commission on **Thursday, February 20, 2020, beginning at 11:00 a.m., and continued, if necessary, as ordered or directed by the Commission.** The hearing shall be held at Conference Room at the office of the Commission, American Savings Bank Building, Room 960, 1001 Bishop Street, Honolulu, Hawaii 96813. Parties may appear by telephone. Any party opting to appear by telephone must notify the Commission, in writing, of this fact no later than **Monday, February 10, 2020;** notification shall include a telephone contact number.

The hearing is being held under the authority of HRS section 84-31 and will be subject to the procedures set forth thereunder, in particular, HRS section 84-31(c). The hearing shall also be subject to the relevant procedures set forth in Hawaii Administrative Rules, Title 21 (Administrative Rules of the Hawaii State Ethics Commission).

The issues before the Commission involve whether Respondent has violated HRS section 84-17 (Requirements of Disclosure law), by failure to timely file Respondent's 2017 financial disclosure statement.


The above-stated issues and the facts alleged in support thereof are set forth in the Further Statement of Alleged Violation, dated February 21, 2019, which is incorporated herein by reference.

Pursuant to HRS section 84-31(c), the hearing shall be held in accordance with HRS chapter 91 and shall be open to the public. The parties may retain counsel; an individual may appear on the individual's own behalf; a member of a partnership may


represent the partnership; and an officer or authorized employee of a corporation, trust, or association may represent the corporation, trust, or association.


