IV. 2021 Legislative Session

- 1. Post-employment
 - i. <u>H.B. 671</u> Prohibits certain state officials and employees from representing certain interests before the State for twelve months after termination from their respective positions. Specifies that the prohibition against disclosing certain information applies to those who were employed by the State for less than one hundred eightyone days. Effective 1/1/2022. (SD2).

2. Lobbyists Law

i. <u>H.B. 741</u> Requires certain Hawaii state ethics commission records to be retained for a period of six years from the date of filing. (SD1).

3. Other

- i. <u>H.B. 670</u> Authorizes a court to order the forfeiture of one-half of the Employees' Retirement System (ERS) benefits of an ERS member, former member, or retirant upon conviction of the individual for a felony related to the State or county employment of the individual. Authorizes designated beneficiaries to receive the ERS benefits to which the member, former member or retirant would be entitled under this section upon the death of the member, former member, or retirant. Prohibits designated beneficiaries convicted of a felony under the same set of circumstances as the member, former member, or retirant who was subject to forfeiture of ERS benefits from receiving benefits.
- ii. <u>S.B. 589</u> Extends the sunset provision in Act 38, Session Laws of Hawaii 2017 (technology transfer).
- iii. <u>S.B. 873</u> Authorizes contested case hearings to use interactive conference technology.
- iv. S.B. 1034 Authorizes boards to use interactive conference technology to remotely conduct meetings under the State's open meetings law. Amends the requirements for public notices of board meetings and for in-person board meetings held by interactive conference technology. Requires the Office of Information Practices to assess the implementation of meetings held using interactive conference technology and submit a report of its findings to the Legislature.

Agenda Item No. I: Consideration and Approval of the Minutes of the April 15, 2021 Meeting

Vice Chair Wood noted a typographical error on the draft minutes. Commissioner Fong made and Commissioner Graulty seconded a motion to approve the minutes of the April 15, 2021 Sunshine Meeting, as amended. The motion carried unanimously (Wood, Graulty, Fong, and McCarthy voting).

Agenda Item No. III: Executive Director's Report

1. Education / Training Report

Executive Director Gluck noted that all trainings were still being conducted via videoconference and reported on some upcoming trainings.

2. Guidance and Assignment Statistics - April 2021

Executive Director Gluck stated that the Commission has received many complaints recently, particularly against private businesses and county-level officials. Executive Director Gluck stated that staff planned to update the website to better inform the public regarding the limits of the Commission's jurisdiction.

3. Appointment of New Commissioner

Executive Director Gluck did not have any new information regarding the appointment of a commissioner to replace Chair Tschumy when her term expires on June 30, but hoped that a new commissioner would be in place by July 1.

4. Miscellaneous Office Projects / Updates

Executive Director Gluck stated that he is working on the cover story about the Commission's functions for the August edition of the Hawaii Bar Journal. He also discussed the logistics for bringing staff back into the office and holding Commission meetings with a combination of videoconference and in-person attendance.

Agenda Item No. IV: 2021 Legislative Session

Executive Director Gluck reported that House Bill ("H.B.") 671 passed the Legislature and was awaiting action by the Governor, and that he is hopeful that the Governor will approve the measure. He likewise reported that the lobbying record retention bill, H.B. 741, was also pending action by the Governor. Commissioner Graulty asked whether we ever discovered the rationale for the bill that would extend the records retention period for lobbying records; Executive Director Gluck stated he still did not know the impetus for that bill. A version of the pension forfeiture bill, H.B. 670, also passed.

At approximately 9:45 a.m., Commissioner McCarthy made and Commissioner

Senate Bill ("S.B.") 589, the technology transfer bill, also passed. Executive Director Gluck stated that the University likes some provisions of the bill and has some concerns about other portions, and Executive Director Gluck was unsure as to the University's final position on the measure. Although Executive Director Gluck has some concerns about the language in the bill regarding the Commission's responsibilities to review technology transfer activities, he believes that the Commission can carry out the new responsibilities if the bill becomes law. As such, he recommended that the Commission simply remain silent for now and wait to see whether the Governor decides to veto the measure.

Finally, Executive Director Gluck stated that S.B. 873 and S.B.1034 also passed the Legislature and were awaiting action by the Governor. These measures would allow for videoconference participation for Commission meetings and hearings even after the emergency measures put in place for COVID-19 have expired. Executive Director Gluck stated that he would review the bills again if they become law but that he believes the Commission is already following best practices with respect to videoconferencing during open meetings.

Commissioner Fong asked about the pension forfeiture bill, and he, Commissioner Graulty, and Ms. Ma discussed the details of the measure.

The Commission adjourned the Executive Session and returned to the Sunshine Law meeting at approximately 9:45 a.m. Any members of the public who were still in the Zoom waiting room were re-admitted to the Sunshine Law meeting.

Agenda Item No. V: Consideration of Order Requiring Financial Disclosures to be Filed Electronically

Executive Director Gluck gave a brief background on this matter, explaining that HRS § 84-17 allows the Commission to require that filers submit their financial disclosure statements electronically. He recommended that the Commission issue an order to require the electronic filing of financial disclosure statements, effective July 1, 2021.

Commissioner McCarthy made and Commissioner Graulty seconded a motion to approve and issue the draft Order Requiring Financial Disclosures to be Filed Electronically. The motion carried unanimously (Wood, Graulty, Fong, and McCarthy voting).

ADJOURNMENT OF SUNSHINE LAW MEETING

At approximately 9:54 a.m., Commissioner Graulty made and Commissioner Fong seconded a motion to adjourn the Sunshine Law Meeting. The motion carried unanimously (Wood, Graulty, Fong, and McCarthy voting).
