GOVERNOR APPOINTS WESLEY FONG AND ROBERT HONG TO HAWAI‘I STATE ETHICS COMMISSION

Governor David Ige re-appointed Wesley Fong to a new four-year term on the Hawai‘i State Ethics Commission, and appointed Dr. Robert Hong to fill a seat soon to be vacated by outgoing Commissioner Melinda Wood. These appointments are effective July 1, 2022.

“It is a testament to the importance of ethics in the State of Hawai‘i that such qualified and reputable candidates are willing to serve and help ensure the highest standard of ethics for our state’s lawmakers, employees, and lobbyists,” said Robert D. Harris, Executive Director and General Counsel of the Hawai‘i State Ethics Commission.

Commissioner Wesley Fong, an attorney, is an adjunct professor teaching law and ethics at the University of Hawai‘i, Shidler Business School. Previously, he served as staff counsel for Firemen’s Fund Insurance Company; a former supervising deputy attorney general for the Hawai‘i Department of the Attorney General; and as a former senior deputy corporation counsel for the City and County of Honolulu. He is also a Vietnam veteran and retired as a colonel in the U.S. Army. He received his Juris Doctorate from the University of Illinois School of Law and an undergraduate degree from the University of Hawai‘i. He is currently the vice-chair of the Hawai‘i State Ethics Commission.

Dr. Robert Hong is a practicing clinical cardiologist and a professor at the John A. Burns School of Medicine. Dr. Hong completed his undergraduate degree from Stanford University in 1977 and received his doctorate in Medicine at the University of California – San Francisco in 1981. Among many professional accomplishments, Dr. Hong is notable for creating the first ACGME-certified postgraduate fellowship in cardiovascular disease in the State of Hawai‘i in 2010, and receiving the Peter C.P. Char Excellence in Education, Program Director’s Award in 2013 and 2016. After 35 years of practicing medicine and holding numerous medical administrative positions, he plans on retiring on July 1, 2022.

The Hawai‘i State Ethics Commission is responsible for administering and enforcing the state ethics code and the state lobbyist law. Commissioners are appointed by the Governor from nominations submitted by the Judicial Council and serve 4-year terms, without compensation. Commissioners may not hold any other public office. Commissioners must be U.S. Citizens and residents of the State of Hawai‘i. ELECTION OF OFFICERS FOR 2022

The State Ethics Commission's administrative rules provide for the annual election of a chair and vice chair whose terms will commence on January 1 of each year. Hawai'i Administrative Rules § 21-1-10 states as follows:

§ 21-1-10 Chairperson and vice-chairperson. (a) A chairperson shall be elected by a majority of all the members to which the commission is entitled, who shall serve for a term of one year or until a successor is elected, with such term to commence on January 1 of each year.

(b) A vice-chairperson, who shall call and chair meetings in the incapacity or absence of the chairperson, shall be elected by a majority of all the members to which the commission is entitled, and shall serve for a term of one year or until a successor is elected, with such term to commence on January 1 of each year.

At the Commission's meeting on January 19, 2022, the Commission voted to keep its current officers in place¹ and defer the election of new officers to July 2022. Accordingly, the Commission should elect a chair and vice chair for 2022 at its upcoming meeting on July 20, 2022.

CALL TO ORDER

Chair Wood called the meeting to order at 9:03 a.m. and noted that, in addition to herself, Vice Chair Fong and Commissioner Tobias were present in person. Commissioner McCarthy attended via videoconference.

Chair Wood announced that if the Commission's video conference connection was lost during the meeting, the meeting would be recessed and reconvened after the connection was restored; members of the public were asked to check the Commission's website (www.ethics.hawaii.gov) for information about reconnecting to the meeting. Chair Wood also announced that if the meeting was continued to a later date or terminated, information about this would be posted on the Commission's website.

Public participants who appeared in person and introduced themselves included Jessica Caiazzo; Wallyn Christian; Karl Dicks; Antionette Fernandez; Kai Lorinc, from

1 Citizens Against Crooked Politicians; and Charlotte Rosecrans. Public participants
2 participating through the online video conference included Sandy Ma, from Common
3 Cause Hawai'i; Rose Marie Jauch; James Ryan Malish; and Eric Sarrafian.

4
5 All participants using the video conference option confirmed they were
6 participating remotely, and no one was in the room with them.

7
8
9 **Agenda Item No. I: Consideration and Approval of the Minutes of the May 18,**
10 **2022 Meeting**

11
12 Kai Lorinc asked if any changes were made to the videoconference file that is
13 posted to the website. Staff confirmed that no changes are made to the posted video
14 files.

15
16 At 9:12 a.m., Commissioner Fong made and Commissioner Tobias seconded a
17 motion to approve the minutes of the May 18, 2022 meeting. The motion carried
18 (Wood, Fong, McCarthy, and Tobias voting).

19
20
21 **Agenda Item No. II: Executive Director's Report**

22
23 Executive Director Harris reviewed the training, guidance, and assignment
24 statistics. He observed the overall number of training participants had noticeably
25 increased. With the likely passage of the Commission's mandatory ethics training bill
26 HB 1475, staff are actively looking at ways to increase participation in ethics training
27 without creating an undue burden on a limited number of staff members.

28
29 Commissioner Fong asked what recourse the Commission has if individual state
30 employees refuse to go through training. Mr. Harris observed that the Commission has
31 its enforcement authority under Hawaii Revised Statutes Chapter 84, but suggested that
32 the focus – at least in the beginning -- may be on trying to get as many people as
33 possible through the training versus looking to bring enforcement actions against
34 individual stragglers.

35
36 Kai Lorinc asked if politicians could be required to undergo ethics training if
37 they're found to violate the ethics code. Mr. Harris noted the bill simply requires ethics
38 training every four years. However, participation in an ethics training could be a
39 condition of settlement of an ethics violation.

40
41 At around 9:30 a.m., Commissioner Gaulty arrived at the meeting in person.

42
43 Kai Lorinc asked about a series of complaints that she said had been filed, and
44 the perception of a backlog of cases currently in front of the Commission. A face-to-face
45 meeting was proposed to discuss questions about any individual complaints that had
46 been filed. Several related questions were asked, and a lengthy exchange occurred

1 about how cases are handled, processed, and how the public is notified when
2 Complaints are resolved.

3
4
5 **Agenda Item No. III: 2022 Legislative Session**
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7 Executive Director Harris updated the Commission about the status of legislation
8 that staff have been tracking. The Commission's budget had been signed by the
9 Governor as Act 001, and a supplemental funding bill (SB 2794 SD1 HD1 CD1) was
10 currently before the Governor. In addition, the Commission's mandatory ethics training
11 bill (HB 1475 HD1 SD1 CD1) was currently before the Governor.

12
13 Executive Director Harris noted the next meeting of the Commission to Improve
14 Standards of Conduct was scheduled and listed the website where more information
15 could be found.¹ Mr. Harris noted the Commission to Improve Standards of Conduct
16 agreed with many of the ethics recommendations, and steps were being taken to draft
17 some of the recommendations or revise ideas in a manner to incorporate feedback.

18
19 Members of the public asked several additional questions about how the Ethics
20 Commission handles complaints, and an informative discussion occurred about how
21 complaints are processed; the sunshine law; balancing of privacy and public
22 transparency; the closing of the State Capitol; criminal violations on Kaua'i, and
23 prioritizing allegations against Legislators.

24
25 At 11:01 a.m., the Commission took a recess.

26
27 At 11:10 a.m., the Commission returned to session. Commissioner Graulty was
28 excused.

45 Commission and Staff.
