IV. <u>Discussion of Media Reports Concerning Ethics or the Ethics Commission Since</u> the Last Meeting

Description: The Commission will discuss recent media coverage related to ethics in

government or the Hawai'i State Ethics Commission. The discussion may include consideration of potential responses, clarification of public information, or other appropriate actions.

V. <u>2025 Legislative Matters</u>

The results of ethics-related bills introduced in 2025 are described briefly below. The blue House or Senate bill number is a clickable hyperlink that goes directly to the bill language online. If the hyperlink does not work, bills can be looked up at "capitol.hawaii.gov" by typing the bill number in the box near the top of the window.

Budget

- HB 1440 HD1. This bill proposes appropriations to cover the operational expenses of several key legislative bodies and offices, including the Legislature, the Auditor, the Legislative Reference Bureau, the Ombudsman, and the Ethics Commission. This bill became Act 001 on March 12, 2025.
- <u>HB 1439 HD1 SD1 CD1</u>. This bill proposes appropriations to cover public employment costs and cost adjustments for employees of the Senate, the House of Representatives, and various legislative service agencies. It proposes an additional \$64,679 in salary adjustments for the Ethics Commission in fiscal year 2025-26. This bill became Act 127 on May 29, 2025.

Commission Procedures

• SB 289. This bill proposes establishing uniform provisions for assessing administrative penalties under the State Ethics Code and the Lobbyist Law. The bill aims to create a streamlined process for the Commission to impose administrative penalties for minor violations, thereby enhancing the efficiency and consistency of enforcement actions. This bill became Act 13 on April 10, 2025.

Lobbyist Law

- <u>HB 412 HD1 SD2</u>. This measure expands the definition of "lobbying" in the state lobbying law to include specific communications with high-level government officials regarding procurement decisions. Additionally, it establishes certain presumptions regarding testimony provided by a lobbyist and potentially renders contracts voidable when entered into in violation of the state lobbying law. This bill became Act 63 on May 16, 2025.
- <u>HB 413 HD1 SD1</u>. This bill clarifies the administrative oversight of statutory restrictions concerning prohibited lobbyist contributions during the legislative session. It also specifies that the regular or special sessions in which lobbyist contributions are banned are

periods when both houses of the legislature are in session. This bill became Act 64 on May 16, 2025.

Nepotism

• <u>SB 1545 HD1</u>. This bill repeals language in the code of ethics that exempts the Legislative Branch from prohibitions against nepotism in public employment. As of April 9, 2025, this measure failed to pass the House and is deferred till next year.

VI. <u>Discussion of Possible Legislative Proposals within the Commission's Jurisdiction</u>

Description: The Commission will discuss potential legislative proposals for the upcoming legislative session, including possible amendments to the State Ethics Code (Haw. Rev. Stat. Chapter 84), the Lobbyists Law (Haw. Rev. Stat. Chapter 97), or other matters within the Commission's jurisdiction. The Commission may provide direction to staff regarding research, drafting, and consultation with stakeholders.

Discussion of case status.

The Hawai'i State Ethics Commission may convene an executive session pursuant to Hawai'i Revised Statutes section 92-5(a)(4) to consult with the Commission's attorneys and/or the Department of the Attorney General on questions and issues pertaining to the Commission's powers, duties, privileges, immunities, and liabilities.

9 Agenda Item No. I: Consideration and Approval of the Minutes of the March 19, 2025 10 Meeting (1:45)

12 Commissioner Hong moved to approve the minutes of the March 19, 2025 meeting, and

- 13 Vice Chair Tobias seconded. The motion passed unanimously with all Commissioners
- 14 present voting in favor.

17 Agenda Item No. II: Directors' Report (3:12)

19 Compliance and Education:

- 20 Compliance Director Chang reported on recent training sessions, including one for Tier 1
- 21 state officials subject to the live training requirement and a second one for the State
- 22 Charter School Commission's annual conference for public charter school administrators
- 23 and governing board members. Staff will be working on making updates to the self-
- 24 directed training modules to reflect recent changes in the law.
- 25

26 Annual Filings:

- 27 Annual financial disclosure filings are ongoing. Over 100 boards were contacted for
- 28 updated member lists. Continuing filers have until June 2, 2025, to file their annual
- 29 disclosures, while new board filers have until the end of July to do so. Staff have been
- 30 receiving a high volume of emails and calls for assistance.
- 31

32 Statistical Reporting:

- 33 Enforcement Director Campbell presented new statistical dashboards illustrating
- 34 complaint trends, attorney-of-the-day data, and resolution types. The data shows
- 35 significant increases in the number of complaints over the past five years. The Commission
- 36 discussed making the information publicly available and including it in future reports to the
- 37 Governor, the Legislature, and the Chief Justice.

39 Quarterly Financial Report:

- 40 Executive Director Harris reported that the Commission remains on track and under
- 41 budget for the fiscal year. He noted that temporary hazard pay related to COVID-19 had
- 42 been disbursed and that any unused funds would lapse back to the general fund.

1	COGEL Annual Conference (December 2025):
2	The Commission discussed attendance at the 47th Annual COGEL Conference in Atlanta,
3	Georgia. Commissioners Fong, Becker, and potentially Vice Chair Tobias (pending
4	reappointment) expressed interest in attending.

6	Staffing Updates:
7	Executive Director Harris announced the departure of Administrative Assistant Myles
8	Yamamoto. He noted that Melissa Vomvoris was recently hired, who brings over 20 years
9	of legislative experience.
10	
11	Brand Guidelines:
12	The Commission reviewed updated branding and logo materials, including a Hawaiian-
13	language translation of the Commission's name.
14	
15	
16	Agenda Item No. III: Discussion of Commission Jurisdiction & Complaint Management
17	<u>(26:20)</u>
18	
19	Executive Director Harris provided an overview of the Commission's jurisdiction under the
20	State Constitution and Chapters 84 and 97, emphasizing that the Commission does not
21	address issues of policy disagreements, allegations of incompetence, or county-level
22	conduct. Commissioners requested that a binder of key jurisdictional documents be kept in
23	the conference room for reference.

26	Agenda Item No. IV: Discussion of Media Reports Concerning Ethics or the Ethics
27	<u>Commission Since the Last Meeting (33:40)</u>
28	
29	Executive Director Harris highlighted a recent PBS Insights appearance where he
30	discussed ethics and campaign finance legislation alongside representatives from Common
31	Cause and the League of Women Voters. Commissioners were invited to raise other
32	reports as appropriate.
33	
34	
35	<u>Agenda Item No. V: Discussion of Ethics Oversight over the Judicial Branch (35:27)</u>
36	
37	Staff Attorney Yamanuha reported on changes to the Judiciary's ethics rules, including new
38	gift disclosure requirements and the establishment of an administrator for the Commission
39	on Judicial Conduct. Commissioners discussed ongoing concerns about administrative
40	independence and potential future engagement with the new Chief Justice.

1 2	<u>Agenda Item No. VI: 2025 Legislative Matters (41:33)</u>
3 4	Executive Director Harris summarized the status of ethics-related bills:
5 6	• SB 289: Authorizes streamlined enforcement procedures, allowing the Commission to issue small fines akin to a "parking ticket."
7	• HB 412: Expands lobbying definitions to include pre-procurement discussions with
8 9	 executive officials. HB 413: Clarifies jurisdictional roles between the Ethics Commission and Campaign
10	Spending Commission for lobbyist contributions.
11	• SB 1545: Sought to extend nepotism laws to legislators but was deferred in the
12	House. The Commission discussed the political dynamics and philosophical
13	opposition to external oversight.
14	
15 16	Commissioner Thielen advocated for the Commission to consider introducing legislation addressing pay-to-play practices. The Commission agreed to place the matter on the June
17	agenda and directed staff to begin researching potential approaches, including
18	constitutional and jurisdictional limitations.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES THIRTY-THIRD LEGISLATURE, 2025 STATE OF HAWAII

H.B. NO. ³⁷¹ H.D. 1 S.D. 1

A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO CAMPAIGN CONTRIBUTIONS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

SECTION 1. Section 11-302, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended by amending the definition of "immediate family" to read as follows:

""Immediate family" means a [candidate's] spouse or reciprocal beneficiary, as defined in section 572C-3, and any child, parent, grandparent, brother, or sister [of the candidate], and the spouses or reciprocal beneficiaries of such persons."

SECTION 2. Section 11-355, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended to read as follows:

"[+]\$11-355[+] Contributions by state [and] or county contractors, state or county grantees, officers or immediate family members of state or county contractors, officers or immediate family members of state or county grantees; prohibited. (a) It shall be unlawful for any person who enters into any contract with the State, any of the counties, or any department or agency thereof either for the rendition of personal services, the buying of property, or furnishing of any material, supplies, or equipment to the State, any of the counties, any department or agency thereof, or for selling any land or building to the State, any of the counties, or any department or agency thereof, if payment for the performance of the contract or payment for material, supplies, equipment, land, property, or building is to be made in whole or in part from funds appropriated by the legislative body, at any time between the execution of the contract through the completion of the contract, to:

(1) Directly or indirectly make any contribution, or promise expressly or impliedly to make any contribution to any candidate committee or noncandidate committee, or to any candidate or to any person for any political purpose or use; or

(2) Knowingly solicit any contribution from any person for any purpose during any period.

(b) It shall be unlawful for any officer or immediate family member of any state or county contractor under subsection (a), at any time between the execution of the contract through the completion of the contract pursuant to subsection (a), to directly or indirectly make any contribution to any candidate committee or noncandidate committee, or to any candidate or to any person for any political purpose or use.

(c) It shall be unlawful for any person who receives a grant or subsidy from the State pursuant to chapter 42F, or from a county pursuant to a county charter or code, at any time between the execution of the contract through the completion of the contract for the grant or subsidy to:

(1) Directly or indirectly make any contribution, or promise expressly or impliedly to make any contribution to any candidate committee or noncandidate committee, or to any candidate or to any person for any political purpose or use; or

(2) Knowingly solicit any contribution from any person for any purpose during any period.

(d) It shall be unlawful for any officer or immediate family member of a state or county grantee under subsection (c), at any time between the execution of the contract through the completion of the contract for the grant or subsidy pursuant to subsection (c), to directly or

indirectly make any contribution to any candidate committee or noncandidate committee, or to any candidate or to any person for any political purpose or use.

(e) Any candidate, candidate committee, or noncandidate committee that receives a contribution made unlawful by this section shall return the unlawful contribution to the contributor within thirty calendar days of receipt. If any unlawful contribution is not returned to the contributor within thirty calendar days of receipt, the unlawful contribution shall escheat to the Hawaii election campaign fund.

[(b)] (f) Except as provided in [subsection] subsections (a), (b), (c), and (d), this section [does] shall not prohibit or make unlawful the establishment or administration of, or the solicitation of contributions to, any noncandidate committee by any person other than the state or county contractor, the state or county grantee, or the officers and immediate family members of a state or county contractor or grantee, for the purpose of influencing the nomination for election, or the election of any person to office.

(g) At the time of the execution of a contract subject to this section, the state or county contractor or grantee shall provide to the state or county office executing the contract a list of the names of any officers and immediate adult family members of the state or county contractor or grantee. For the purposes of assessing compliance with this section, the state or county office shall make the reported information available electronically to the commission, which shall then make the information available to candidate and noncandidate committees on a password-protected section of the commission's website; provided that the state or county office shall not be required to make the reported information available for procurements of less than \$100,000 for goods or services or \$250,000 for construction.

[(c)] (h) For purposes of this section, "completion of the contract" means that the parties to the government contract have either terminated the contract [prior to] before completion of performance or fully performed the duties and obligations under the contract, no disputes relating to the performance and payment remain under the contract, and all disputed claims have been adjudicated and are final."

SECTION 3. Section 11-364, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended by amending subsection (a) to read as follows:

"(a) Any candidate, candidate committee, or noncandidate committee that receives in the aggregate more than the applicable contribution limit in section 11-357, 11-358, 11-359, or 11-360 shall return any excess contribution to the contributor within thirty <u>calendar</u> days of receipt of the excess contribution. Any candidate, candidate committee, or noncandidate committee that receives in the aggregate more than the applicable contribution limit in section 11-362 shall return any excess contribution to the contributor within thirty <u>calendar</u> days of the end of the election period; provided that the candidate, candidate committee, or noncandidate committee may choose which contributions to return. Any excess contribution not returned to the contributor within thirty <u>calendar</u> days shall escheat to the Hawaii election campaign fund."

SECTION 4. This Act does not affect rights and duties that matured, penalties that were incurred, and proceedings that were begun before its effective date.

SECTION 5. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed and

stricken. New statutory material is underscored.

SECTION 6. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 3000.

Report Title:

CSC; State or County Contractors; State or County Grantees; Officers; Immediate Family Members; Prohibited Contributions

Description:

Prohibits state or county grantees and officers and immediate family members of state or county contractors or grantees from contributing to candidate or noncandidate committees, candidates, or any person for any political purpose for the duration of the contract. Requires any unlawful contribution to be returned to the contributor or it will escheat to the Hawaii Election Campaign Fund. Requires disclosures of the names of any officers and immediate adult family members of a state or county contractor or grantee for contracts exceeding a certain amount. Effective 7/1/3000. (SD1)
